In all sincerity and humility, an article like the one mentioned above, should wake in us once more the zeal for our religion. We can be ashamed of the past, but with God's help, we can still be proud of the future.

Our subject of honor, was born to the late Joseph Bacsardi and Julia Barca on Jan. 17, 1912 in the town of Berwick, Pa. He was the third of five children. At the age of 2, the family moved to Garfield, where Paul has lived ever since.

He attended schools #1, 2, & 5, graduating from the latter. After taking a correspondence course, he got a job at U.S. Rubber. Even while working, Paul attended Rutgers College at nights taking a course in Business Administration. His will to increase his learning paid off. He began as an ordinary laborer 24 years ago at U.S. Rubber and now still works there but as quality control supervisor.

In was in this Church on Oct. 23, 1937 that he claimed Rose Pecsí permanently as his own, and from this union they have one child, Paul, Jr., 7 years old. Home to Paul is 9 Louise St., still in Garfield. When he is not home making model airplanes with his son, Paul is usually to be found around the Church.

He is a member of the Perez Council of the K. of C., the Vice-President and a charter member of the Holy Name Society. He is also a Trustee of the Parish.

Paul's love for the youngsters and for music explains the keen interest he has for our own Drum and Bugle Corps of which he has been the Drum Major for the past 13 years. He is justifiably proud of the fact that in 1942, he won the Senior Drum Major Championship in the Eastern States.

Although our Drum and Bugle Corps has won many distinctions under his capable leadership, Paul tells us that he will not rest until they have taken the national championship. Here's wishing you and the boys luck!

ATTENTION, ALL PARISHIONERS!

According to latest reports, we find that the Puppet Government in Hungary is endeavoring to take away even the most basic rights of our blood-relatives still living or rather existing in that country. Already they have taken over all of the schools, they have closed the churches, they have taken away all their possessions, they have imprisoned or forced into exile the Bishops and priests. As for the lay people themselves, they have been enslaved by the tens of thousands. Just recently, in the dead of the night, the Communist overlords carried off almost 30,000 Hungarian people. To this day, no one knows where they were taken and no one dares ask where they are.

The highest Ecclesiastical leaders at present are in prison. Cardinal Mindszenty has been sentenced to life imprisonment. His successor, Archbishop Joseph Groesz, who is the head of the Diocese of Kalocs and who became the latest victim of Russian terrorism, was condemned to 15 years in prison. Their only sin was the fact that they tried to exercise those rights which God has given to all men equally. This recent devilish, soul-killing persecution sickens us and we raise our voices and vehemently object to the treatment to which our blood relatives are being subjected. The United States Government sacrificed several hundred thousand lives of young men in the interest of preserving Christian civilization. Our official government made peace treaties with the then existing Hungarian government and through these agreements assured the people that they would have the opportunity of exercising their rights of democracy.

As our representative, dear sir, we implore you in the name of humanity to raise your voice in objection to this infamous, devilish persecution that is going on this very moment in Hungary.

Indeed would we be Pharisees and fools if we were to let the cries for help fall on deaf ears.

The above-written paragraphs are to give you some idea as to what to write to your Senator or Congressmen in protest of the persecutions in Hungary. We ask that each of you take it as a matter of conscience to write to one of the following.

If you live in Passaic, Clifton, or Paterson, write to the Hon. Gordon Canfield, House Office Bldg., Washington, D. C.

If you live in Garfield, Lodi East Paterson, Fairlawn or Rochelle Park, write to the Hon. William B. Widnall, House Office Bldg., Washington, D. C.

If you live in Wallington, Rutherford or Hasbrouck Heights, write to the Hon. Harry L. Towe, House Office Bldg., Washington, D. C.

You might also write to both the Hon. H. Alexander Smith and Robert C. Hendrickson, Senate Office Bldg., Washington, D. C.

We ask that you do not copy the article word for word but that you make it sound as original as possible. But above all, write at least one letter.

We appeal to you who have relatives in Hungary to realize how much you can do for those you hold dear to you.

We appeal to you who were in military service to write lest your many sacrifices go entirely in vain.

Even if you do not have any relatives in Hungary or were not in military service, we appeal to you in the name of humanity to raise your voice in protest.

The few minutes it will take you to write one letter will be rewarded by Him, Who said that He would reward us even if we only give a cup of water to one in need, if we give it in His name.

THE KIDDY CORNER

Boys, and you girls, too, do you know what is the worst disease known to mankind? It is a disease called leprosy. It is a disease where your fingers, arms, ears, nose, and other parts of your body just rot away and fall off. There is an island called Molokai in the South Pacific where people go who have this disease, because we do not want other people to catch that disease.

Well, here is a story that you might like. During the Civil War there was a lieutenant in the Union Army named Joseph Dutton. He was known as the handsomest, the bravest, and the best officer in the army. Lieutenant Dutton had an orderly, an old man whom the soldiers had nicknamed Old Man Reilly. Old Man Reilly was to have a great effect on the life of Lieutenant Dutton. One day Dutton asked Old Man Reilly a question. The answer he got changed his whole life.

The lieutenant asked his orderly "You have been with me some years. In that time none of my things have ever been stolen. What makes you so honest?" Old Man Reilly answered "I am a Catholic and the teaching of the Catholic Church is that if you steal anything, you have to give it back. So what's the use of stealing?"

Dutton was very much impressed with this and had many a talk with Old Man Reilly after that. The result was that years later he, too, became a Catholic. But the story doesn't end there. Many years later when Father Damien of the Leper Colony in Molokai died, it was this same Dutton who now as a religious brother took charge of the place.

This shows you what good example can do. The good example of Old Man Reilly in the army led to Dutton becoming a Catholic and then a religious brother in a leper colony. You can never tell how far your good example will go. Every little thing that you do is very important because it sets the example for other people. If you do good things all the time then people will get good examples from you. But if you are always doing bad things then

people will get bad examples from you.

All through the year your priests and your Sisters are trying to teach you what is right and what is wrong. You have no better time than now during the summer to show that you have really learned something. Who knows, maybe through your good example one of your friends might become a Catholic, or if he is a Catholic already he may become a better Catholic.

How can you show good example? Be obedient to your father and mother, and show the good example to your other brothers and sisters or friends. When you are passing a Church, stop in for a few minutes to pray and show the good example of praying to your friends. Why every time you go to Church on Sunday, you are showing good example to your family and your friends. Every time you refuse to eat meat on a Friday, you are showing the good example again.

One time when President Theodore Roosevelt was making a tour around the world, he stopped in front of the little island of Molokai and had the boat fire a salute with the guns in honor of Brother Joseph Dutton, who gave his life to the lepers. While this is very nice, it is a shame that people forget that it was the good example of Old Man Reilly who made this possible.

This story should make us happy and proud that we are Catholics and that our Church teaches us how important it is to show good example always. Let us try to do this every day during the summer. Try it just for one day, and I'll bet you all the ice cream in the world that at night when you say your night prayers and you remember all the good you did during that day, you will be real happy. Maybe we won't get credit from other people for showing other people good example, but we know for sure that God will not forget us. All that we ask, is that you try it for one day - just one day. You will, won't you?
