FELLOWS, MEET DR. ERNEST JOHNSON!

It was on Sept. 8, 1915 in Passaic that Sir Stork visited Edward Johnson and Vilma Glazer for the 7th and last time, leaving a baby boy to be christened: Ernest Edward. Since the family lived in Passaic and Clifton alternately, young Edward attended the school systems in both cities. Recognizing his talents, his parents sent him to Syracuse University where he received his B.A. and later his M.D. in 1942. After spending his internship at Medical Center in Jersey City, he joined the Navy and served as surgeon on the Destroyer U.S.S. Beatty in the Mediterranean which was followed by a longer stay in the South Pacific with the Marines.

On leaving the Navy with the rank of Lt. Commander, Dr. Johnson returned to Medical Center as Resident Surgeon from 1946-1949. It was in 1949 that he opened his office for practice at 242 Lexington Ave., Passaic. Since that time Dr. Johnson has been building up a wonderful practice and is establishing himself as one of the up and coming doctors in this vicinity.

In addition to membership in the Holy Name, Dr. Johnson belongs to the following organizations:- Phi Chi Medical Fraternity, Association of Military Surgeons, American Medical Association, Academy of Medicine of northern New Jersey, American Legion Post 347, Amvets (Louis Lombardo Post, Garfield), Passaic County Medical Society, New Jersey State Medical Society, Candidate for American College of Surgeons, and he is eligible for diplomacy with the American Board of Surgery. Dr. Johnson also insists that all his dues are paid up, too! He also still holds his rank as Lt. Commander in the U.S. Naval Reserve.

After the founding of the Holy Name, the "Doc" was the first man of our Parish to join in the first membership drive. With his practice taking most of the time, it is a treat to have him drop down occasionally to a meeting or the spaghetti dinners he loves. Continued good luck, "Doc". P.S. Yes, girls, the doctor is still a bachelor!

SCHOOL REGISTRATION

If you want to find out the truth about what goes on in our own Parish school, for heaven's sake, get your information from the source, either from the rectory or the convent. But above all, remember to register your children NOW!!!

THE KIDDY CORNER

There was once an Arab scholar named Malluch. He was young and strong and wise. But Malluch's brow was wrinkled with thought as he walked out of the Caliph's palace one day. A Caliph, you know, is an Arab Ruler. The Caliph had just told Malluch to do what seemed impossible. He had told him to write all the wisdom of the world into one little book. What would you do if someone told you to do that? You wouldn't know, Neither did Malluch know what to do. But he was young and strong and wise. He began to travel the world, to study and to write. After ten years he returned to the Caliph and said: "My Lord, I have brought you all the wisdom in the world, but it is not in one book. It is in five hundred books." "It will not do," said the Caliph. "I have not time to read five hundred books."

Malluch went off again and took his five hundred books with him. Ten years later he came back with the wisdom of the world in a hundred books: "It will not do," said the Caliph, "my sight is failing and I have not time to read a hundred books before I die." Malluch went off again. He was himself no longer young and strong. He must hurry. He worked and worked until he had all the wisdom of the world down to fifty books, but the Caliph was still not satisfied.

Malluch went home and cried himself to sleep. He was awakened by a little boy saying things out loud from a small book. Malluch took the book, read it, and ran quickly to the Caliph with it. "Here, my Lord, is the wisdom of the world in one book. Take and read." The Caliph read it and said, "You have done well, Malluch. It will do. Name your reward." Malluch left the palace mumbling to himself, "If I had only found this book thirty years ago, I could have saved myself a lot of trouble."

Now what was the book that Malluch took to the Caliph in such a hurry? Three guesses. Here it is if you don't believe me. Yes, the Catechism. All the wisdom of the

world in one little book.

There are many people walking around our cities at this moment who are trying to find the answer to some very important questions. They are asking themselves, "Where did I come from? Why am I here? Where am I going?" In trying to find the answer they walk around in circles as Malluch did. They could find their answers very easily in the Catechism. "God made me to know Him, to love Him, and to serve Him in this world and to be happy with Him in the next."

This is why the Catechism book is so important. The priests could tell you many, many stories about people, who like Malluch, wandered all over the world, went to many different schools, trying to learn the wisdom of the world. Some of them never found it because they died before it. But many times, when people learn about God when they are old, and then they, like Malluch say: "If I had only found this book thirty years ago I could have saved myself a lot of trouble."

Now we know it is not easy to study the Catechism. Sometimes it is hard to understand our lessons. Sometimes it is just as hard to learn the answers. But all good things are hard to get. A lot of times I guess we would rather be doing a lot of other things than to be studying our Catechism book. But everyone of you know that if we really want something worth while we must work hard for it. A boxer must keep practicing and studying the way other boxers fight if he wants to become a good boxer. A good pitcher keeps studying all the batters so that he can find their weaknesses. And the same with the batters; they keep watching the pitchers so that they can learn things from them. And so if you want to lead a good life and get to heaven, don't wait until it is too late. Study your Catechism now so you will never have to say: "If I had only found this book thirty years ago, I could have saved myself a lot of trouble."

Some time ago each Parishioner received one raffle book. With the drawing date, August 16, just a short way off, we would like to remind you to send in your returns as soon as possible. If you have purchased or sold one book, please return the stubs with the proper amount as soon as possible. There is a great deal of work entailed in checking the account and folding the stubs. Please do not let it go until the last minute.

In the event that for some reason best known to you, you cannot get rid of the book, please remember that it is Church property and therefore you have the obligation of returning it to the Rectory.

Above all, please try to sell as many books as possible. With each stub you sell, you are helping your Parish, which in the long run means that you are helping yourself. Other people approach you for the same purpose, now, why not do the same to them. But, please get the books in early. For addition books, please contact the rectory.

IN SUPPORT OF YOUR CHURCH

We all know that we as residents have the obligation of supporting the United States Government. We do this by paying taxes - luxury tax, income tax, amusement tax, and all other kinds of taxes. We also have the same obligation of supporting our own Parish thru our monthly dues. It has always been the practice in our Parish for each family to give one dollar a month towards this, or for single people to give 75 cents.

Of late many people are forgetting about the obligation that each one of us has individually of contributing towards the support of the Church. Just as we cannot say to the government that we won't pay taxes because our parents pay them, so we can't say it about Parish dues. The year is coming to an end soon, so please do not let this go until the last minute. But above all, remember that each one has this obligation.

Because of the lack of time, the Holy Name Society has decided to postpone the annual Pig Roast which is usually held in September until October. As yet, no definite plans have been made as to date and price of admission, but advance notice will be given in next month's edition of the BULLETIN.

The only anticipated change as regards the Roast, will be that we shall try to make this affair the best we have ever had up to now. Keep your eyes open for details.
